

Introduction

In 2009, John received the devastating news that he had myeloma, an incurable blood cancer, and like the patients he had cared for at his GP practice in bayside Melbourne, he believed this diagnosis meant he was not expected to live for more than a few years. When Rob heard his father's news, just four weeks after the birth of his son Will (John and his wife Pam's first grandchild), he became determined to ensure that his children would have the chance to create precious memories with their grandfather, and the seed of what would become the Snowdome Foundation was planted. "All we needed was a cure and the numbers didn't look good for life expectancy; from what we had heard from Dad's doctor it was three to five years at best," recalls Rob. Driven by a desperate desire for his son to grow up knowing what a great person his grandfather was, Rob, a self-confessed 'doer', quickly sprang into action, and within months he had connected with Professor Miles Prince AM, a leading Australian haematologist, and Grant Rutherford, an internationally recognised creative director who, in the same year as John's diagnosis, tragically lost his nine-year-old daughter Chloe due to complications from leukaemia. Together, Rob, Miles and Grant founded the Snowdome Foundation, each personally motivated to find a cure for blood cancer through medical research.

Since forming in 2010, Snowdome Foundation has enabled over \$95 million to unlock access to new treatments by channelling philanthropic investments into early phase human clinical trials of next-generation treatments. Snowdome is the leading not-for-profit organisation exclusively focused on raising funds to support translational research into blood cancers, providing Australians with blood cancer the best opportunity for a cure. To date, Snowdome has extended over 84 research grants to fund over 105 multi-year research positions. Across Australia, we have facilitated 129 clinical trials, helping more than 2,771 patients access world-class clinical trials.

Vision

To give every Australian blood cancer patient the best opportunity for a cure.

Mission

To accelerate next-generation treatments for Australian blood cancer patients, to help them live longer, better lives.

Snowdome Strategic Priorities

Snowdome Foundation assists Australia's best clinicians and researchers with much-needed funding to support their work. Snowdome has a mission aligned granting process that identifies key strategic priorities to fight blood cancer including:

- Advancing innovation through translational research, clinical trials, emerging blood cancer research, novel treatment platforms or therapies
- New innovations in genomic and molecular profiling including translational and functional genomics
- Targeted and cellular therapies and their derivatives
- Precision medicine

The Opportunity

Snowdome is inviting applications for a myeloma project supported through funding for a three-year fellowship (with the third and final year contingent on performance). This grant aims to address unmet needs in myeloma by supporting a project designed to accelerate clinical implementation and improve outcomes for patients. Funding will support cutting edge, high quality translational research, including existing or planned clinical trials and studies focused on new therapies.

The successful applicant will receive maximum funding of \$133,333 per year for up to three (3) years. Total funding available is \$400,000. Pre-set milestones will be agreed upon in advance.

Eligibility Criteria

- The researcher will preferably have a PhD with postdoctoral experience in haematology. Candidates without a PhD should provide evidence of their substantial expertise and accomplishments in areas relevant to the grant focus on myeloma. Equivalent experience may include, but is not limited to, extensive research experience in academia, industry or government settings, with a proven track record of contributions to the field of medical research.
- Australian citizen or eligible for permanent residency and will be conducting research at an Australian research institute.
- The successful appointee will perform top quality, high impact research towards the discovery of new therapies that are aligned with the Snowdome Foundation's mission and strategic priorities.
- The project must specifically be applicable to or address myeloma through the support of existing or planned cutting-edge, high-quality translational research (3-5 years), clinical trials and studies, or be targeted to new drugs in therapy.
- The research should be primarily conducted in translational human clinical studies in preference to animal studies.
- Track record of successful completion of research projects, presentation of research results at conferences, internal forums and via published manuscripts.
- Institutional commitment required to provide research space, resources (equipment).
- Pharmaceutical funded late phase or registration clinical trials, or research activities adjunct to such trials will only be considered if proposed as a separate project aligned with the Snowdome Foundation's strategic priorities.
- The research must not predominantly involve supportive care or psychosocial support or be for infrastructure such as registries and databases

Assessment Criteria

- Alignment with Snowdome Foundation's vision, mission & strategic priorities.
- Alignment with eligibility criteria.
- Strength and scientific quality of research proposal, including feasibility, innovation & novelty, pathway to translation, clinical implementation & patient access impact.
- Potential for the project to contribute to sustainable delivery or impact including through leveraged funding or strategic partnerships.
- Investigator(s) capability, including track record of successful completion of research project and strength of CV & publications.

Applications will be subject to review by members of the Snowdome Foundation Grants Committee and expert selection panel. The Snowdome Foundation reserves the right not to award the John Tandy Myeloma Haematology Fellowship if no suitable applicants are identified.

Eligible Costs

The successful applicant will be eligible to receive funding of up to \$133,333 per year for an initial term of up to two (2) years, with a performance-based option to extend for an additional one (1) year.

Applicants must justify use of the requested budget. Budget items must be directly related to the proposed research project. Expenses must be incurred between the grant start and end dates. Allocated and indirect costs will not be funded.

Eligible expenditure costs may include:

- Salary costs
- Recurrent costs & costs directly attributable to the project such as patient recruitment, research services
- Consumables
- Equipment essential to conduct the proposed research
- Research Governance/Ethics fees

* With the exception of applicants who request a salary at 1FTE where at least a 90%-time commitment is acceptable, all other salary and time commitments must be equivalent. Part time positions (stipend pro rata) will be considered to a minimum of 0.8 EFT.

How to Apply

Applicants should carefully follow all outlined instructions when applying.

Submit the following in one document no later than 10am AEST on Monday 15th June 2026 to grants@snowdome.org.au:

- **Completed Application Form**
- **Statement of Support:** a letter of support from the institution (mentor/supervisor) that highlights the applicant's dedication to blood cancer research and the potential impact of the research.
- **Curriculum Vitae (CV):** The CV should be no more than 2 pages and must include:
 - key positions (last 5 years)
 - highlight impact/achievements in the field
 - top ten publications (last 5 years)
 - awards (past 5 years)
 - Up to 3 references
 - 100 word statement of impact of your research on clinical outcomes

Submissions must be submitted electronically in one document (word or PDF) with the file name JohnTandyFellowshipApplication_[Surname]
